Comments **dingo safe interpretative material encourages walkers to carry a stick.**

Detailed report of events: At 1800 on the 1/1/14 [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the p] were walking on the beach approximately 1km south of the Oaks, where they were staying. They were approached by a dingo that eventually came close enough to [sch4p3(3)] to sniff his legs. The couple did not feel threatened and tolerated this behaviour. [sch4p3(3)] noticed that the dingo had an Orange tag in its left ear. Soon after this, Six other dingoes came from the dunes, ran towards the couple and surrounded them. [sch4p3(3)] moved his [sch4p3(3)] into the water and threw his water bottle at the Orange tagged dingo. The dingoes backed away briefly and [sch4p3(3)] thought he and his [sch4p3(3)] would be safest in the water, so they began moving into the water further. The dingoes continued to attempt to surround the couple, so they moved deeper into the water. [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the p] were eventually neck deep in the water. The dingoes were apparently attempting to swim out to them, however could not get through the waves, according to [sch4p3(3)]

After 5 minutes the dingoes lost interest and ran back onto the dune. [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the p] began exiting the water, however once they were in waist deep water the dingoes "Made a beeline" for the couple once more. The dingoes again pushed the couple into neck deep water. After another 5 minutes the dingoes began losing interest. At this point a man driving a white Prado noticed what was going on and began driving at the dingoes as they exited the water. This allowed the couple to exit the water and hop into the car, where they were taken back to their accommodation at the Oaks.

Additional comments and notes: There have been multiple interactions in this vicinity involving an Orange tagged male dingo displaying this behaviour. This dingo has been previously identified as GBW11m.

AMMENDED 10/9/14 by 7026480 - Orange tag male dingo amended to GBW11m after review of information and consultation with staff. Interaction area, behaviour, group number, and description are consistent with GBW11m.

Action taken: Interviewed and briefed [sch4p3(3)] as well as other guests staying at their accommodation. Conveyed that dingoes must be deterred when they approach anyone closely and to carry a stick when walking outside of accommodation. Circulated report.

Proposed further action: Continue to provide dingo safety briefings to Guests on or close to their arrival at the Oaks accommodation.

Comments The camper remained calm, the camping area was reported to be clean of rubbish and food. All information received in this report was taken "third hand", the family camping in this area was due to leave the Island that morning and no details of the man involved was known. A neighboring camp site reported the incident to me while briefing and patrols.

Detailed report of events: Male camper about 40 yrs of age was having a cup of tea about 4.30am Sunday 5/01/14. He had his head down making his tea, looked up and saw a large male dingo very close to him approximately 1.5m away . He had a large torch handy and swung it at the dingo in an effort to scare him away. The dingo did not move, instead showed dominant behaviour towards the man and possibly growled at him. After the camper grabbed a spare tent pole and threatened the dingo, it eventually left the camping area.

Additional comments and notes: Identification of the dingo was unknown, but the man believed it to be an adult male dingo.

Action taken: Incident reported to ranger's 7027330 and 7027202, incident report draft completed and sent to 7026466 for finalising.

Proposed further action: Continue to monitor this area and provide education briefings.

Comments

Detailed report of events: Two Sunrover tour vehicles were travelling along the Eastern Beach when they observed a male visitor jogging on his own. The tour leaders saw 6 dingoes in the area, 2 adult males (larger) and 4 juveniles (smaller). The two adult dingoes started to chase after the jogger, nipping at his heels, and forced him into the ocean.

The Sunrover tour guide (Reg) shouted out to the jogger not to go into the water as the dingoes love it, before stopping and picking up the jogger in his vehicle. The jogger was dropped at Eurong.

sch4p3(3) (Sunrover tour guide) said that one of the adult male dingoes was tagged, but could not make out the colours, and she did not notice whether the other adult was tagged or not.

No details of the jogger were obtained by Sunrover tour guides.

Additional comments and notes: There is a known family pack in the Eurong area that are seen regularly on the beach between Govi CA and Cornwells CA. It is possible that the two dingoes involved in this incident are RYY07m and PuWW12m.

sch4p3(3) stated to QPWS staff that she had been advised by her colleague not to report the incident to QPWS as "they will just go out and shoot them all".

Action taken: Interview conducted and report generated. RIC NRM informed.

Proposed further action: Patrols to be conducted early morning and late afternoon in this area while visitation and dingo activity is high.

Comments

Detailed report of events:

Dingo Ranger 7027330 received a phone call from [sch4p3(3) Prejudice t] (manager Cathedral Beach Resort) on the morning of 8/01/2014 notifying him that they had received a report from a camper that had intervened in a dingo interaction that morning. Ranger 7027330 contacted other rangers for assistance.

Ranger 7026804 patrolled the Eli and Maheno camping areas for the campers that had reported the interaction but was unsuccessful at locating them.

Ranger 7028018 contacted Cathedral Beach Resort who confirmed that the campers were setting up camp within the resort. Rangers 7028018 and 7028020 drove to the resort to interview the campers.

At approx. 08:00 on the 8/01/2014 [sch4p3] and his friend were driving north from Happy Valley along the beach, noticed a man (from a distance) jogging backwards trying to discourage two dingoes.

The man (identity unknown) was jogging along the beach between Happy Valley and Eli Creek and was approached by two dingoes (described as small dingoes). The dingoes proceeded to follow closely behind the man as he was jogging. As the dingoes approached closer the man turned around to face them and tried to discourage them by throwing sand and yelling. The dingoes were not discouraged and proceeded to lunge at the man forcing him backwards into the ocean.

[sch4p] and his friend saw the jogging man from a distance and headed towards him placing their vehicle between the dingoes and the man. The dingoes circled around the vehicle in an attempt to continue lunging at the man in the ocean. The man got into the rear seat of the vehicle.

The two dingoes on the beach headed towards the foredunes where two other dingoes (described as larger dingoes) were sitting and watching. The four dingoes then headed into the Eli camping area. Moments later the dingoes were chased out of the camping area by a man swinging a shovel.

[sch4p3] and his friend dropped the jogger off at Happy Valley.

[sch4p] and his friend relocated themselves from the Eli camping area to Cathedral Beach Resort as they were concerned for their safety and the safety of the dingoes if anything happened.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p] and his friend stated they did not look for or notice any ear tags on the dingoes involved in the interaction when asked. The dingoes (larger) sitting on the foredunes were too far away to see if they were tagged.

Dangerous dingo signs have been installed in all camping areas from Winnam and Cathedral Beach Resort since mid 2013.

A habituated pack are known to frequent the area between Poyungan Rocks and Eli Creek. Members of this pack have been involved in recently reported high risk behaviour.

Action taken: RIC NRM contacted. Campers interviewed and a report generated and circulated.

Proposed further action: Continue regular ranger beach patrols and camper briefings. Increase the regular liaising with private enterprises and CTO's that are within or frequent the area. Implement a strict no jogging policy on Fraser Island in light of the increased interaction activity by dingoes towards joggers on the island.

Comments **The jogger did not follow 'dingo safe' messaging as she was running on her own and without any form of personal protection such as a stick.**

Detailed report of events:

Rangers 7027904 and other were briefing campers within the Eli camping area on the 10/01/2014 when they were approached by [sch4p3(3) Prejud] who reported that she had been bailed up and herded into the ocean the previous evening.

On the evening of the 9/01/2014 [sch4p3(3) Preju] was running along the beach at approx. 17:30 just north of the Eli camping area, when she was approached by 5 dingoes. [sch4p3(] tried to deter the dingoes by throwing a piece of pumice stone at the larger dingo (described as having a red tag), but the dingo reacted aggressively 'charging at her' (lunging). The other 4 dingoes (described as smaller untagged dingoes) also started lunging at her and the pack forced [sch4p3(] into the ocean. The driver of a passing vehicle saw the interaction and drove their vehicle between the dingoes and [sch4p3(] allowing her to enter the vehicle and drive away safely.

Additional comments and notes: There have recently been multiple interactions in the areas between Poyungan and Eli Creek involving an Orange tagged male dingo displaying high risk behaviour. This dingo has been previously identified as GBW11m.

Ranger 7028020 stopped [sch4p3(] while she was jogging along the beach the morning of the 9/01/2014 and briefed her on 'dingo safe' messaging, recommending that she did not run. The interaction happened the evening of the same day whilst she was jogging alone along the beach.

Rangers were patrolling the beach within area around 17:30 but were unaware of [sch4p3(] jogging and the interaction.

Action taken: RIC NRM contacted. Jogger interviewed and a report generated and circulated.

Proposed further action: Continue regular ranger beach patrols and camper briefings. Increase the regular liaising with private enterprises and CTO's that are within or frequent the area. Implement a strict no jogging policy on Fraser Island in light of the increased interaction activity by dingoes towards joggers on the island. Consider closure of all camp areas between Poyungan and Eli.

Comments **Campers were staying at Cathedral Beach Resort and had received and read all material given to them.**

Detailed report of events: [sch4p3] is family and another family (4 adults and 3 children) were at Eli Creek when they noticed the approach of an adult (large) male dingo and two juvenile dingoes (smaller). The four adults were sitting on the bank of the creek watching the three children (aged 6, 10 & 7) play in the water about 20m away.

The male dingo trotted along the edge of the creek towards the group, stopping just in front of the adults (between the adults and the children). The dingo looked at the adults on the bank, put his head down, turned and ran straight towards the children.

As soon as the dingo started running [sch4p3] threw his beer can at the dingo and ran towards it shouting. The other three adults in the group yelled at the children to stand up and not run. Two more visitors, who were nearby, also ran towards the children.

The dingo got within 5m of the children before changing direction and running up a steep incline on the far side of the creek. [sch4p3] says that the dingo would take a few steps, stop, turn around and look at the group, before continuing up the hill, as they packed up and left.

[sch4p3] returned to Cathedral Beach resort and reported the incident to [sch4p3(3) Prejudice t] (manager). [sch4p3(3)] reported the incident to QPWS on 11/01/14.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3] and his family were at Eli Creek on the evening of 08/01/14 about 17:30 when they noticed a male dingo and two juveniles in the area sniffing and digging in the sand but not paying any special attention to the people onsite. [sch4p3] said that the dingoes involved in this incident looked to be the same dingoes they had seen previously however the behaviour of the male dingo was noticeably different - it did not stop to sniff or dig, and trotted at a steady pace until it stood between the adults and the children. The group did not discourage the dingo as they thought he would continue doing his own thing as he had done on the previous occasion.

The dingo shown in the photos (attached) is GBW11m, determined through comparison of photos, the location of the incident and previous high risk behaviour in the area.

QPWS ranger 7028020 was patrolling between Poyungan and Eli on the afternoon of 10/01/14. GBW11m and 2 untagged juvenile male dingoes observed at the northern end of Eli CZ at approximately 17:30 (see previous Code C report). Ranger observed dingoes until they moved out of the camping area and then continued patrolling south.

Action taken: Incident reported to Cathedral Beach resort on 10/01/14. Cathedral Beach Resort reported to QPWS on 11/01/14.

Interview conducted with [sch4p3] at Cathedral Beach resort, photos provided and sketch drawn by [sch4p3] (attached below) collected.

Proposed further action: Continue dingo safe briefings and current increased monitoring and patrolling in this area and Eurong area while visitation and dingo activity is high. Extra patrols will continue to be conducted by QPWS rangers between 05:30 and 07:00 and 16:30 and 18:00 in these areas.

Due to the increase in high risk behaviour of the habituated dingoes between Poyungan Rocks and Eli Creek investigate the possibility of closing camping areas (Poyungan, Winnam Guluri & Eli) whilst high risk behaviour is occurring. Management to assess current risk and advise of further action to be taken.




Comments [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the pro] **was fishing alone.**

Detailed report of events: Ranger 7028018 was responding to a report of an interaction at Yidney Rocks on the night of the 3/03/2014, when he was approached by [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the p] (Yidney Rocks [sch4p3(3) Prejudice] who reported a separate interaction.

At approx. 16:30 [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the p] was fishing on the beach just south of Yidney Rocks when he noticed two dingoes approaching from the south. The two dingoes (described as smaller dingoes) approached within a couple of meters and started circling around him. [sch4p3(described the dingoes behaviour as 'herding' him into the water. [sch4p3(was up to his waist in the ocean but managed to move around the two dingoes and quickly walked towards Yidney rocks. The two dingoes followed [sch4p3(3) closely all the way to the Yidney rocks beach stairs. On several occasions [sch4p3(made contact with the dingoes with his fishing rod when they approached too closely but he said this did not deter them at all. Once [sch4p3(walked up onto the rocks he said he felt safer but the dingoes still loitered around on the beach.

Approx. an hour later whilst cleaning a fish (at the Yidney Rocks accomodation) [sch4p3(heard a noise behind him. One of the dingoes involved in the earlier interaction was sitting on the grass just meters away from him. [sch4p3(yelled and waved his hands at the dingo but the dingo didn't move. The dingo eventually left on its own accord.

Additional comments and notes: No ear tags were noticed in the either of the dingoes ears during the interaction. The dingo pack frequenting between Poyungan and Eli Creek are highly habituated and showing increasing negative dingo/human interactions. The 'smaller' dingoes [sch4p3(described are most likely juvenile members of this pack.

Action taken: Interview conducted by NRM ranger and report generated and circulated. RIC notified.

Proposed further action: Continue ranger patrols of the eastern beach and camp areas. Increase ranger briefings to visitors at Yidney Rocks and The Oaks accommodation during the Easter holidays.

Comments [sch4p3(3)] **has been a resident on Fraser Island for many years and actively promotes QPWS safe messaging to all Yidney Rocks visitors.**

Detailed report of events: At approx. 21:00 [sch4p3(3) Prejudice t] (Yidney Rocks manager) left her apartment at Yidney Rocks to walk across the lawn to [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the] (Yidney Rocks manager) apartment. [sch4p3(3)] noticed a dingo only a few meters away watching her. [sch4p3(3)] stopped, stood still and faced the dingo. The dingo ran at [sch4p3(3)] (described as charged), growled and dominance tested (described as bouncing from side to side). [sch4p3(3)] yelled for help (screamed) and a male guest staying at the Yidney Rocks apartments came running with his fishing rod in hand. The man ran at the dingo yelling and waving his fishing rod making contact with the dingo a number of times. The dingo promptly left the premises.

Additional comments and notes: The man who chased the dingo away was involved in an interaction with a number of dingoes at Yidney Rocks on the 3/03/2014.

[sch4p3(3)] voiced her concerns on the increasing number of dingo interactions around Yidney Rocks. [sch4p3(3)] was also concerned that a number families with children and school groups are booked into the Yidney Rocks accommodation over the Easter Holidays.

[sch4p3(3)] could not identify the individual dingo but mentioned that it was a juvenile dingo regularly seen loitering around the Yidney Rocks premises.

There is a highly habituated dingo pack occupying the area between Poyungan Rocks and Eli Creek. Its likely that the dingo involved in this interaction is part of this pack.

Action taken: Yidney Rocks contacted by NRM ranger. Interview over the phone and a report generated and circulated. Senior management notified.

Proposed further action: Continue ranger patrols of the eastern beach and camp areas. Increase ranger visitor briefings at Yidney Rocks and The Oaks accommodation during the Easter holidays. Maintain the camp area closures between Poyungan and Eli Creek until after the Easter holidays.

Detailed report of events: On Monday the 17.03.14 [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the] went for a jog along the beach north of Happy Valley on her own. [sch4p3(3)] had reached roughly 2km north of the township when she decided to return. When she turned around she noticed a dingo within 3-4 meters of her. [sch4p3(3)] began to walk back towards the township and the dingo continued to follow. [sch4p3(3)] attempted to deter the dingo by 'shooing' - this had no effect as the dingo then snarl/growled at her, and then continued to follow close behind. [sch4p3(3)] continued to progress towards Happy Valley and successfully waved down a passing vehicle for a lift back.

Detailed report of events: The party of 2 vehicles (3 adults and 2 children) passed 2 dingoes on the beach then pulled up at their usual fishing spot. [sch4p3(3)] stayed with her two girls (1 & 3) sitting and playing in the sand between the close vehicles while the others fished.

One of the dingoes they passed came over to the vehicles to where [sch4p3(3)] and the 2 children were. It came within 2 metres. [sch4p3(3)] attempted to shoo it away on numerous occasions unsuccessfully.

[sch4p3(3)] saw what was happening and returned from the water to assist, waving a pvc rod holder at the dingo in an attempt to move it on. The dingo was persistent in trying to approach the children who were playing in the sand in close proximity (within hand reach) to their mother.

The dingo began to display dominant/submissive testing (dancing around) towards [sch4p3(3)]. The dingo eventually settled down and sat approximately 3-4 metres away from the group. [sch4p3(3)] kept the PVC pipe with her and use it to shoo the dingo as it persisted in attempting to come closer.

A group of people with a 14-15yo teen approached the group then retreated back to Happy Valley when they saw how the dingo was behaving. A number of vehicles stopped for [sch4p3(3)] and enquired as to the safety of herself and the children.

They were there for around 2 hours. The dingo stayed for the entire time, GGPI13f was still there when they left.

Additional comments and notes: The dingo was not considered aggressive by the party, described as more of a nuisance. Party are long term visitors to the island aware of dingo-safe behaviour. They advised they have never encountered behaviour such as this previously.

The groups were catching fish continuously and keeping them in the tray of one of the vehicles - this could have contributed to the dingo staying in the vicinity of this group.

Action taken: Interaction reported from firsthand account. Report produced and forwarded.

Proposed further action: Continue morning and afternoon patrols. Continue briefings with campers and visitors. Monitor behaviour of the known pack in this area. Continue the closure of campzones between Poyungan Rocks & Eli Creek.

Detailed report of events: [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the protection of an indiv] were travelling north along the beach to go fishing when they noticed a male fisherman in the ocean at quite a depth with 3 dingoes actively swimming towards him. The man was going under water as the waves were breaking over his head and the dingoes were getting knocked about by the breaking waves. As they got closer they noticed that one of the dingoes was a female with a 'red' tag but could not identify the other two. [sch4p3(3) Pr] drove the car right up to the water's edge and [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the prote] got out of the car, grabbed a couple of lengths of poly pipe (fishing rod holders) and waded into the surf to try and discourage the dingoes. The dingoes were chased off and by the men, yelling and actively chasing them, and moved south down the beach away from the group. The fisherman in the sea was able to make his way out, and though shaken, was not harmed. [sch4p3(3) Pr] [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the prote] continued up the beach once they were sure the dingoes had left the area.

Detailed report of events: Whilst walking along the beach, sch4p3(3) and an off duty QPWS ranger suddenly noticed BWR13m appear from the dunes and run straight towards them. Both walkers continued to walk while keeping an eye on the dingo, which proceeded to follow them at a distance of between 2m & 10m.

The walkers stopped to see if the dingo would continue past them, however it got to within 2m and started displaying dominance testing behaviour (jumping from side to side, huffing and snorting, baring teeth, etc). At this point the QPWS ranger yelled at the dingo, clapped their hands and waved a stick towards it. The dingo backed off a few metres and stood watching.

The walkers continued on, with the dingo again following closely behind. They stopped a couple of other times however the dingo would not continue on past them - stopping within 5m each time. When sand was kicked in its direction it would back off to around 10m before moving back in.

After about 20mins the walkers stopped again at the water's edge and the dingo continued on past them. The walkers let the dingo get about 50m in front of the before continuing to walk south towards Eurong. The dingo headed up into OTR CZ of its own accord after a few minutes. The dingo did not re-appear.

Additional comments and notes: this dingo had been involved in a Code C approx. 1hr prior.

Action taken: Photos obtained, report compiled and circulated.



Detailed report of events: At approx. 15:00 on the 19 April, two teenage girls were swimming in the surf opposite Yidney Rocks accommodation. The mother of the girls was sitting at the accommodation watching them when she noticed a dingo approaching. The dingo saw the girls and started running towards them. The mother quickly ran down to the beach to try and deter the dingo by screaming, yelling, clapping her hands and throwing sand but the dingo wasn't deterred and wouldn't leave. The mother and the two girls retreated into the surf to get away from the approaching animal but the dingo followed them into the surf.

A passing vehicle stopped and asked if they were ok, which they promptly replied that they weren't. The driver of the vehicle tried on numerous occasions to drive in between the ladies and the dingo but the dingo kept circling the car to get to them. The driver of the vehicle drove into the surf to retrieve the three ladies and drive them to safety.

Additional comments and notes: The identification of the dingo was confirmed by the mother and two teenage girls as GGPI13f as the same dingo had been harassing them for days around the Yidney Beach accommodation. Whilst interviewing the mother GGPI13f was trying to get into their car only meters away. The dingoes' id was confirmed by the mother and the interviewing ranger.

Comments [sch4p3(3)] **was fishing approximately 200-300m away at the time. He was confident that both girls are aware of dingo safe messages as they are regular visitors.**

Detailed report of events: Initial report of Code D interaction was provided by local Happy Valley resident [sch4p3(3) Prejudi] who was involved in a Code C interaction slightly north of Happy Valley at 1720hrs (separate incident report generated). At the time of interviewing [sch4p3(3)] (who was working with a fish offal bag), GGPI13f was persistently within 1m of him, and [sch4p3(3)] identified GGPI13f as having been involved in "chasing two girls" approximately ten minutes earlier. We continued our patrol north to Eli Creek and on our return past Happy Valley we were flagged down by a fisherman who identified himself as the father of the two girls who had been involved in the interaction. [sch4p3(3)] had also mentioned this interaction to QPS Sergeant [redacted] [redacted] who asked [sch4p3(3)] to identify tag colours - which he did as "green and pink tagged female".

The father, [sch4p3(3)] stated that the two girls (both 14) had been about to collect pippies with a bucket approximately 200-300m north of where he was fishing (which would put them near the northern boundary of the 40km zone in front of Happy Valley). The girls bucket was empty at the time of the interaction, which began when they noticed a dingo running at them at pace. The girls backed into the ocean but the dingo continued towards them. A few vehicles were reported to have tried to intervene by placing themselves between the girls and the dingo, but it persisted in moving around the vehicles. At one stage the girls were waist deep in the ocean. The interaction concluded with an unidentified Toyota Prado driving into the ocean and allowing the girls to get inside and they were then dropped into Happy Valley township.

Additional comments and notes: GGPI13f is highly habituated, not wary of adults or rangers and has been involved previously in at least one Code D interaction and numerous Code Cs.

Action taken: Reported to NRM staff member 7028020 who passed information along to 7026466 1748hrs.

Proposed further action: Monitor behaviour closely, especially with early morning/late afternoon patrols. Continue opportunistic beach briefings in known territory.

Comments

Detailed report of events: Approx. 08:15 on 22nd of April, ranger 7028018 (whilst patrolling the beach) noticed a dingo (BWPI13f) loitering around fishermen and walkers. The dingo was chasing birds, running into the ocean and around people on the beach.

The dingo noticed a group of walkers (three ladies and a child) and started running towards them. When ranger 7028018 was within close proximity to the walkers, BWPI13f was circling and nipping at their stick. The walkers were actively trying to deter BWPI13f but she was reacting by approaching closer and nipping their stick. Ranger 7028018 drove his vehicle between the dingo and the walkers and asked them to please walk towards the fenced Eurong township. BWPI13f repeatedly tried to circle around the car to get to the walkers. A Palace tour leader saw the interaction, drove up and asked if we needed assistance. The ranger responded "yes" but the tour operator mustn't have heard and drove off.

A Kingfisher bus driver exiting the Eurong township also saw the interaction and drove the bus between the dingo and the walkers. BWPI13f was behaving agitated and aggressive (mouthing and cough growling) and started circling the bus and the ranger vehicle. BWPI13f then tried to run at the walkers but was stopped by the bus driving between her and the walkers. The bus driver opened his door and moved the walkers into the Eurong fenced township.

Additional comments and notes: One of the walkers was stopped (whilst walking alone along the beach) and briefed by ranger 7028018 earlier that morning (approx. 07:15). The ranger recommended that she doesn't walk alone and walk with a stick. She responded that she hadn't seen any dingoes (BWPI13f was only 50 meters away trying to solicit food off fishermen) and that she has German Shepherds. The lady walked up the beach and retrieved a stick from the dunes.

Action taken: Interviews taken and a report generated and circulated. RIC notified.

Proposed further action: Continue early morning and afternoon ranger patrols between Dilli Village and Eli Creek during the busy Easter/ANZAC holiday period. Continue ranger visitor and camper briefings.

Comments **[sch4p3(3)] was walking alone without a stick.**

Detailed report of events: Rangers 7026804 and 7028020 were informed that 2 Poyungan Rocks residents had intervened in an interaction on 29/4/14 late on 30/4/14.

Contact was made with **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** from Poyungan rocks on 1/5/14 to gain some information relating to the interaction. They stated that they had driven out of Eurong Second Valley and noticed that the beach was completely empty except for a woman up to her waist in the water and 2 dingoes in the area. As they got closer they observed that a male dingo was in the ocean up to his neck (was almost swimming) trying to get to the woman in the ocean and a female dingo was lying on beach at the water's edge. **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** pulled up at the water's edge and attempted to scare the male dingo away by throwing pumice at it. The dingo would move away a short distance before returning - this happened several times.

A Discovery tour bus pulled up to see if they could help - putting their bus between **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** and the dingoes. At this stage the dingoes stayed on the far side of the bus, allowing the woman to exit the water and get in the car with **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** and be driven back to Eurong. **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** were able to ascertain that the woman was a Eurong Resort employee, and dropped her off at the shop.

Ranger 7028020 then interviewed the employee involved in the incident at Eurong Resort. **[sch4p3(3)]** stated that she has been walking along the beach on her own when she noticed two dingoes coming towards her. One of the dingoes ran straight towards her and she attempted to make it leave by raising her arms above her head and trying to make herself bigger. When this did not work she chose to walk into the ocean, however one of the dingoes followed her into the ocean and would not leave. The second dingo stayed close and sat at the edge of the water watching.

[sch4p3(3)] then said that some neighbours had then stopped to help her and had dropped her back inside the fence.

Additional comments and notes: **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** were not able to provide any tag colours. They also stated that the woman was not injured but appeared shaken up.

[sch4p3(3)] was not able to say whether the dingoes were male or female or had any tags. She said they appeared 'fattish'.

Action taken: Interviewed **[sch4p3(3) Preju]** and **[sch4p3(3)]** Briefed **[sch4p3(3)]** on dingo safe behaviour. Report completed and circulated. RIC notified.

Proposed further action: Continue patrols of this area, including mornings and afternoons. Monitor behaviour of known habituated dingoes in this area. Install new signage within resort area when available. Investigate translation of dingo safe messaging into Japanese & Korean.

Comments **[sch4p3]** and her partner indicated that they had received a dingo safety briefing from a Ranger on 28/4/14 (the day they arrived at Eugarie CZ).

Detailed report of events: **[sch4p3]** states that:

* at some point between 6:00 and 7:00 am on 29/4/14 she was squatting down over a toilet hole that had been dug into the sand approximately 25 metres from their camping structures.

* she noticed the dingo approaching rapidly from the north of where she was

* she quickly stood up and noticed that her partner had also approached from the direction of their camp in an attempt to move between her and the dingo

* the dingo approached to within a couple of metres of where she was located and she reports that it had its mouth open and teeth bared "looking like it might try to bite me".

* she reports that the dingo did not make any attempt to bite her but did make a "half hearted" lunge toward her while her partner was trying to drive it away.

* **[sch4p3]** partner moved between her and the dingo very quickly after the dingo approached and was able to ward it off away from their camp.

* **[sch4p3]** and partner indicated that they have been extremely vigilant around their campsite in relation to keeping food and rubbish secured on the back of their (dual cab trayback) vehicle.

Additional comments and notes: Incident was reported late in the day on 1/5/14

[sch4p3] and partner stated that at various times during their stay they have observed a pack of 4 dingoes moving freely through the area in which they are camped.

[sch4p3] was unsure if the dingo that approached her was one of this pack.

Action taken: Thanked **[sch4p3]** and partner for bringing this incident to QPWS attention.

Comments **made an attempt to follow QPWS dingo safe messaging. When this did not deter the dingoes, he felt he would be safest in the water.**

Detailed report of events: [sch4p3] was Jogging north along the beach approximately 400m south of the Eurong township at 1730 on the 26/5/14. He first noticed 3 dingoes ahead of him standing 30m from the water. The dingoes began approaching [sch4p3] so he attempted to deter them by standing tall and shouting at them.

The dingoes then began to run towards [sch4p3] so he thought he would be safest in the water. The dingoes followed him as deep as they could stand, so [sch4p3] entered the water to his waist depth.

[sch4p3] stayed in the ocean at his waist depth while the Three dingoes stood in the water for approximately 5 minutes. During this time he called 000 to report, he was "being attacked by dingoes". He noticed a car approaching and it attempted to take the dingoes focus from the him in the water. The dingoes began to run at and circle the car. [sch4p3] then attempted to exit the water, before the dingoes would then turn their attention back to him and he would have to retreat back to waist depth.

The occupants of the car shouted to [sch4p3] that they would go to get some help. The car left [sch4p3] in the water and went to the eurong resort to report that someone was "being attacked by dingoes". Two of the dingoes followed the car while one remained at the waters edge. [sch4p3] remained in the water for approximately 5 minutes, until the car returned. When the car returned the remaining dingo left the scene [sch4p3] entered the car and was returned to his camp.

Additional comments and notes: RIC NRM received a phone call from the Eurong resort at 1740, reporting that, someone was being attacked by dingoes. RIC NRM immediately called ranger 7026936, to investigate.

As [sch4p3] was entering the vehicle, a QPS police officer [sch4p3(3) Prejudice th] asked if he had been "attacked by dingoes", as a 000 call had been made. [sch4p3] was able to confirm to [sch4p3] that he made the 000 call.

Action taken: sch4p3 was returned to his campsite and interviewed.

Proposed further action: Continue to brief lone walkers and joggers regarding dingo safety. Consider including warnings to visitors regarding dingo safety while walking or jogging on Fraser Island.

I have just been notified from the Government Call Centre that a camper at One Tree Rocks has had Dingo's get into the tent and destroy it. Apparently no food was in the tent at the time, but given that the campers have a small child they want to report the issue and move campsites ASAP.

The booking number is [sch4p3(3)] Starting 26/5 for 10 nights, 5 Adults and 1 Child. Car Rego is [sch4p3(3) P]

Could someone please contact [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the protection of an] ASAP.

Phone contact made with [sch4p3(3) Prejud] at midday, Wednesday 28th of May. She advised that up to five dingoes had been problematic at their camp since their arrival on Monday 26th of May with persistent loitering and ripping holes in all four of their tents/camper trailers on Tuesday 27th of May (separate code C interaction reported will be generated); accessing food from plastic clip lock containers and canvas camp cupboard stored within the tents/trailers. On one of their camper trailers there was evidence in the form of scratch marks on the canvas and small holes suggesting that a dingo(es) had attempted to enter. At 0200hrs on Wednesday 28th of May, [sch4p3] and her husband, mother [sch4y.o.) and son [sch4y.o.) were awoken by the noise of a dingo ripping the screen within their camper trailer in which they were sleeping. The dingo fled at the disturbance of the campers awaking and was thus unidentified, but it was evident that the dingo had pushed under the external flap doors (which were not fixed to a ground sheet) and then scratched a hole in the internal screen in an attempt to enter (the hole was within 300mm of the head of [sch4p3(3) sleeping [sch4y.o. mother). [sch4p3(3) group initially contacted 13 74 68 in an attempt to report the interaction and to get advice on alternate, 'safer' places to camp.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3] claimed to have sighted the following tags on dingoes during the course of her stay in One Tree Rocks camping zone (may or may not have been involved in this interaction) - green tag in right ear (predominant dingo that would come in closest to camp); pink tag in left ear and blue tag in left ear. [sch4p3] last visited 5 years ago and she commented that dingo behaviour was markedly poorer now. Interaction was also reported verbally to QPS [sch4p3(3) Prejud] who came into office to check whether we were aware of it.

Action taken: Offered ability to relocate camp to Central Station campground (fenced); reported verbally to Eurong Dingo Ranger and NRM RIC on 28.05.2014.

Proposed further action: Consider temporary closure of One Tree Rocks and Wongai camping zones to mitigate current dingo activity and reduce likelihood of interactions with humans.

Comments **Attempts to find family involved in interaction have been unsuccessful so far.**

Detailed report of events: Information derived from account given by Nomads tag along tour leader [sch4p3] shortly after interaction occurred. At 1700 on 5/6/14, [sch4p3] was walking out the beach bar access gate of the Eurong township when he noticed a dingo standing 2m from the gate. He said he clearly saw that the dingo was tagged in its left ear with the colours Blue White Red on the tag.

[sch4p3] continued walking down towards the water with his group whilst keeping an eye on the dingo they had seen at the gate. He also noticed that there was a family standing at the water's edge with 2 young children approximately 5 and 6 years of age. [sch4p3] said he saw the children begin to run around at the water's edge and noticed the dingo running quickly from the gate towards them (approx. 80m away). [sch4p3] described this as "the dingo Made a beeline for the kids".

[sch4p3] was approximately 50m from the children and began to run to intercept the dingo 3m before the children. [sch4p3] said the parents didn't seem concerned about the dingo and the children continued to run around 5-6m from their parents. Whilst [sch4p3] was keeping himself between the dingo and children, he was attempting to deter the dingo by yelling, waving his arms and slapping his thong on the sand. [sch4p3] was also urging the parents to go and get their children. This continued for a few minutes while members of [sch4p3] tag along group came to assist him in deterring the dingo. [sch4p3] said he got a stick about 20cm long off one of his group and threw it over the dingoes head, at which point it ran away.

Additional comments and notes: BWR13m is one of the 2013 born Eurong Juveniles who is known to be habituated and has previously been involved in 6 Code C, 2 Code D & 1 Code E interactions in the last 2 months.

[sch4p3] said that while he was deterring the dingo from the children, he saw that it was the same dingo that they he had observed moments before at the gate, Blue White Red tag in the left ear.

[sch4p3] said that he remained on the beach with his group until dark and observed the kids playing 5-10m from the parents at times. He did not see the dingo return.

Action taken: Report came to ranger 7026936 at 1740 from ranger 7026804. Contact was made with [redacted] from Eurong resort at 1750, brief statement obtained. Contact was made with [sch4p1] at 1800 who provided a detailed account of his version of the interaction. According to [sch4p1] the Family involved was staying in Happy Valley, an attempt was made on the morning of the 6/6/14 to catch up with the family, to no avail.

SR's notified morning of 6/6/14. Report generated and circulated 6/6.

Proposed further action: Patrol area until dark to brief families, lone walkers/joggers and fishermen with regard to dingo safety and food security.

Late in the afternoon on the 25/06/2014, a KBRV tour group was walking along the z force track when they were approached by a dingo. The dingo circled around them and bounced around on its front paws, with its tail up and mouthing the air. The tour leader cautioned the tour participants to stay close and stand still. After a few minutes the dingo left on its own accord.

Additional comments and notes: A member of the tour group filmed the dingo circling them. The dingo's behaviour was described as 'playful'.

[sch4p3(3)] KBRV manager) reported that a dingo (described as 'she' but the gender is unconfirmed) is regularly seen occupying the beach between McKenzies Jetty and Dundonga Creek and has interacted with a number of guests.

Trail camera monitoring confirms that a juvenile dingo (gender unconfirmed) is regularly seen occupying the Kingfisher Bay resort beach front.

Action taken: Reported to QPWS by KBRV management. RIC and dingo ranger notified. Interview conducted and a report generated and circulated.

Proposed further action: Obtain the camera footage from KBRV to ascertain identification features. Continue monitoring the area and maintain regular contact with KBRV management. If the dingo persists loitering near/around visitor areas implement capture and tag procedures.

Detailed report of events: On the 27/07/2014 at approx. 1030, a Kingfisher Bay Resort & Village (KBRV) bus tour, led by [sch4p3(3) Prejud] was visiting Eli Creek. [sch4p3(3) Prejud] had noted two dingoes (a male and female that were both tagged) sitting in the sand dunes just north of Eli Creek. A dutch family (parents and three young boys) who were part of the KBRV tour started walking along the creek towards the area where the dingoes were situated. The three young boys playing in the creek started running and the male dingo, noticing the children, became excited and started running quickly towards them. [sch4p3(3) Prejud] yelled at the parents to protect the boys. Several other visitors that were close by intervened (yelling, chasing and throwing cans at the dingo) between the dingo and the family. The male and female dingoes then left the area travelling north along the dunes.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3(3) Prejud] stopped ranger 7027848 and reported the interaction. Ranger 7028018 also contacted [sch4p3(3) Prejud] via phone and confirmed that the dingoes were tagged but positive identification wasn't obtained.

Members of a habituated pack are regularly seen in this area. There have been regular reports of this pack being allegedly fed and encouraged. CTO operators have been asked to assist QPWS in ensuring dingo safe messages are conveyed to their tours and anyone they feel they can or need to approach to discuss with if behaving inappropriately towards dingoes.

Action taken: Interaction reported and a report generated and circulated. SMU & NMU 2IC's notified

Proposed further action: Continue regular ranger patrolling of the areas. Continue educational briefings to commercial tour operators and visitors on dingo safe behaviour.

Detailed report of events: At 1525 on 01/08/14, ranger 7026936 arrived at the Eli creek DUA where he witnessed a male dingo tagged Blue Red Green (see photo below) loitering around visitors and was greeted by KBRV tour bus driver [sch4p3] [sch4p] reported a dingo interaction that he had witnessed 10 minutes prior, while his group were stopped at Eli ck, involving the male dingo that was still loitering around the DUA.

BRG13m was witnessed by [] passing through visitors and their cars parked around the edge of Eli creek. There were a number of people that were taking photos of the dingo as it passed through. [sch4p3] said that there was a young girl about 4 years old, playing in the middle of Eli creek approximately 10m from her parents on the bank. [sch4p3] also said that he saw the dingo stop and look at the little girl before running quickly at her into and through the creek. The dingo ran to within half a meter of the girl when it was scared off by several of the people that were photographing the dingo, who ran and yelled at it.

Additional comments and notes: A second witness, Tour guide for Hummer tours, [sch4p4] relayed the same interaction to ranger 7026936 and confirmed that it was the same dingo that was still loitering around the Eli creek DUA and also that this was the only dingo in the area around the time of the interaction. Eli creek has been patrolled regularly by rangers since 30/7/14 and BRG13m has been the only dingo that persistently loiters in this area.

Action taken: Two witnesses interviewed. Notified RIC and SR MUST. Report generated and circulated. Regular (3 times a day) patrols carried out to Eli creek DUA.

Proposed further action: Educate families of the potential risk in this area to children.

[redacted] wife was behind him with a fishing rod and [sch4p3] took the fishing rod and waved at the dingo while his wife yelled and the dingo moved away about 20m, stood around for a couple of minutes and then continued along the beach.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3] also reported another Code D involving his son and grandson (Code D report completed and circulated).

Detailed report of events: Whilst in Happy Valley township rangers 7028020 & 7027330 were approached by [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the] who reported an incident from 12/08/14.

[sch4p3(3)] reported that he had been fishing on the beach near the 40km/hr sign at Eli Creek around 16:30-16:45 when he noticed three dingoes about 100m north up the beach approaching another two fishermen.

He observed one fisherman (later identified as the father) walk up to the car to get some bait and the other fisherman (later identified as the son) remained in the water fishing. As the father returned to the water the three dingoes came straight over to him and followed him within 1m back to the water (he was walking quite fast) and then proceeded to flank him until he was in the water to his thighs. The two fishermen were yelling and waving their hands around to deter the dingo without any luck so [] ran towards them and assisted in chasing the dingoes up into the dunes where they then continued north.

[sch4p3(3)] told rangers that the incident had been reported to the dingo information hotline by the fishermen involved (report below).

[sch4p3(3)] was unable to give any ID's on the dingoes but thinks that two of them were possibly male.

Additional comments and notes: Report from Dingo Hotline:

" [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the protection of an indiv?], Happy Valley and his son [sch4p3()] and grandson [sch4p3(3)] were fishing last night around 5.30, 6pm south of Eli Creek (near 40k zone) and were bailed up by three dingoes with no provocation. One dingo (leader of pack) had a pink and green disc in left ear. Luckily someone came to their aid as they were having trouble fending off the three dingoes. No-one was bitten but they said it was quite scary.

The son [sch4p3()] had earlier chased a dingo out of the back of his ute and was a bit aggressive then.

Grandson's [sch4p3(3)] phone (not sure of his age) is [sch4p3(3) Prejudi

Ranger called [sch4p3(3)] on 13/08/14 to confirm the details of the incident, no answer on phone and message left.

Detailed report of events: [sch4p3(3) Prejudice] were camping at the Waddy Beach Front Campsite and went for a walk on the beach on Wednesday 20/08 at 5pm. They came across a dingo near the beachfront entrance to the beach. The dingo prevented any forward movement by the couple through dominant behaviour (lunging, growling, and circling within 1m). [sch4p3] became worried when the dingo persisted in this behaviour for 10 minutes, during which time [sch4p3] tried to deter the dingo and protect his wife by yelling and waving. Another visitor, who had seen the interaction, intervened and drove their car between the couple and the dingo. The dingo then seemed to lose interest and moved off into the bushes.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3] described the dingo as having dark fur along its back and a green tag. Photos attached below are from an interaction earlier in the day around the same area and show PuGR13m who matches the description given. This animal was seen in the area during the day; however no positive identification can be made in this case.

Comments **The fisherman couldn't believe how brazen the dingo was, even though he had ample warnings of dingo through signage.**

It stopped within a metre of him and began growling and baring it's teeth.

This allowed [sch4p3(3)] to retreat to his vehicle and once he was in the car the dingo lost interest and proceeded north to Indian Head.

Recent observations of a green tagged male around Waddy Point have shown a sub-adult dingo with a delaminated tag. This animal has been identified as PuGR13m.

Detailed report of events: Report was provided [sch4p3(3) Preju] who had been involved in an earlier incident with the same animal and had closely observed the dingoes' movements.

The dingo had been discouraged from area of earlier incident and ran north along top of dunes approximately 200 metres.

It then proceeded to sit on top of the dunes and watch a small child who was sitting on the sand in front of a vehicle which was occupied by its mother.

[sch4p3(3)] noticed that when the mother's attention was diverted, the dingo ran down the dunes towards the child.

The mother reacted swiftly, picking up the child and retreating to the vehicle before the animal reached them. The dingo circled the vehicle several times before the vehicle drove away.

Report of interaction by [sch4p3(3) Prejudic] obtained over the phone on 05/09/14:

When the group he was in stopped to fish at Indian Head a dingo with a green tag in its left ear approached the group displaying aggressive behaviour and had to be deterred by [sch4p3] driving his vehicle between the animal and another group member (see separate interaction report).

After the dingo had lost interest in the group [sch4p] saw the dingo fix its attention on a mother and child approximately 200m north up the beach.

[sch4p3] watched the dingo through his binoculars as it travelled along the dunes and sat above the mother and child watching. The child was outside the car and the mother was approx 20m away.

[sch4p3] observed the mother turn her back and as soon as she did the dingo ran straight down the dunes and towards the child.

The mother got to the child first and both of them got into the car. A nearby fisherman chased the dingo away into the dunes.

The dingo returned to the dunes and sat and watched the car, until about 20mins later the mother and child got out of the car again.

The dingo sat and watched until the mothers attention was diverted again and once again ran straight out of the dunes at the child. The mother again gathered up the child and returned to the vehicle. The dingo was again chased away by a nearby fisherman.

This occurred at least twice and maybe three times before the woman drove away.

[sch4p3] spoke to a guy at the Orchid Hotel to advise him of the incident and the behaviour of the dingo. [sch4p3] also left a message on the Dingo hotline reporting the interactions.

Additional comments and notes: Recent observations of a green tagged male around Waddy Point have shown a sub-adult dingo with a delaminated tag. This animal has been identified as PuGR13m. If an identification in the earlier interaction is made this report will be amended.

Action taken: Report generated. Dingo ranger and duty officer advised.

Proposed further action: Continue camper briefings and advise visitors on increased dingo activities. Observe and report any dingo behaviour in the area.

Detailed report of events: * [sch4p3()] is staying with various family members in Wyuna CZ.

* [sch4p3()] was fishing in knee deep water adjacent to their campsite at approximately 10:10am today (07/09/14)

* [sch4p3()] states that he saw a dingo (he was not aware there was a dingo nearby) running quickly toward [sch4p3()] from the foredune area near their camp.

* The dingo entered the shallow water directly behind [sch4p3()] and maintained its position there even as [sch4p3()] tried to get it to move away.

* [sch4p3()] was able to move out of the water somewhat but the dingo was attempting to keep him there according to what [sch4p3()] could see. [sch4p3()] description was that it "was rounding him up".

* Several other campers staying a couple of hundred metres to the south of [sch4p3()] were sufficiently concerned about [sch4p3()] safety that they got into their vehicle and tried to drive between the dingo and [sch4p3()].

* [sch4p3()] states that the dingo was not easily deterred away from [sch4p3()] even as the vehicle was being driven at it.

* The dingo eventually moved off and [sch4p3()] was able to return to camp.

Additional comments and notes: * The group were asked to remain vigilant regarding the possible movement of this dingo around their immediate camp area - they have several young children.

* The group were asked to try and photograph this or any other dingoes that they see in the area during the course of the stay and provide them to Rangers.

* The group were given a Dingo-safe briefing prior to being notified about the incident (ie. I briefed the members of their party that were not fishing and only received the information about the incident after I moved on to the next campsite (which was [sch4p3()] camp).

* Nil other reports from nearby groups regarding any negative dingo encounters were reported to me during the time I was in this area.

Comments [sch4p3] **commented that the man with the pregnant partner stated he was a regular visitor to the island however it was his wife's first visit.**

Detailed report of events: On or around 7:30am [sch4p3] was travelling south in a convoy of two vehicles on the eastern beach and witnessed a dingo following an adult male carrying a stick. The dingo was about 20 feet away from the man and was increasing its pace.

[sch4p3] stopped the vehicle near the man who walked at a quick pace to meet [sch4p3] this caused the dingo to also quicken its pace towards him. When the man got to [sch4p3] vehicle the dingo veered off and went to the water's edge and laid down until it saw a couple in their late 20's walking along the water's edge a distance away.

The dingo returned to the mid beach area and waited, watching the couple walk. When the couple (still walking at the water's edge) got to ~35 metres away the dingo crouched down and ran directly towards the couple (video footage shown to ranger).

[sch4p3] beeped the car horn to warn the couple. The noise caused the dingo to temporarily halt its advance and man shielded the woman behind him. [sch4p3] then drove his car between the dingo and the couple.

Both vehicles were fully occupied so the couple and the other male who was originally walking, walked as a group of three back to the Oaks residential area [sch4p3(3) P] (driver of the second vehicle) gave the couple an old umbrella to use if required for protection against a possible further dingo interaction.

Additional comments and notes: Graham photographed the dingo involved shortly before the interaction occurred (see photos below). From these photographs rangers 7026936 & 7026466 were able to identify the dingo as BWR13m. BWR13m is a member of the Eurong pack.

Action taken: Interaction reported and residential areas (Yidney Rocks and the Oaks) advised of dingo behaviour in this area.

Proposed further action: Continue liaison with owners/managers of residential areas (Yidney Rocks and the Oaks) regarding dingo behaviour in this area.



Husband and wife with their two small children went for a walk to look at Lake Garawongera and encountered two sub-adult dingoes coming down the path towards them.

As the dingoes approached, the dingoes split up and came at the family from opposite sides.

The dingoes pushed them into a tight group and proceeded to lunge and circle, coming within 2 metres of the family.

The family followed safe dingo procedures and stood back to back with the children in between the adults.

The father tried to discourage the dingoes by yelling, however the animals weren't deterred and persisted to circle and lunge for what they estimated to be 5-10 minutes.

It wasn't until the father was able to pick up a stick and swing at the dingoes, that they were able to slowly make their way back to the vehicle.

Once inside the vehicle the dingoes continued to circle until the family drove away.

Additional comments and notes: This interaction was also reported via the Dingo.Ranger e-mail address.

Photos were obtained from the family, and are attached below. Although no identification is possible from the photos, BWR13m is known to currently be frequenting this area and has a red button and spike which can be identified as a red tag. BWR13m has recently been involved in a Code D interaction at The Oaks beachfront.

[sch4p3(3) Prejud] and four other campers from Waddy Top camp ground were walking from camp over Bingih sand blow to South Waddy beach.

•Half way across the blow around 7.00am on the 3/10/2014 they were confronted by what they described as an "excited but playful" Dingo (photos below).

•They reported it as having a Pink tag in the left ear.

•The dingo came within two metres of them and began to dominance test the group (photo1).

[sch4p3(3) Prejud] described this behaviour as "played around",

•They felt uncomfortable and proceeded to gather sticks for protection.

•The dingo then followed the group the rest of the walk until they reached South Waddy.

•The dingo eventually lost interest and left on its own accord.

Additional comments and notes: Photographs taken during the interaction by [sch4p3(3) Prejud] have been analysed by dingo rangers. The dingo involved in interaction has been identified to be BBR10m. Although the description of the dingoes behaviour was reported as "excited and playful" this was assessed as a dominance test.

Dominant/submissive testing – often described as playful behaviour, prominent amongst younger animals. Animal/s will approach close to humans (<5 metres) and may jump around and yap and nip in an excited manner. Aggression from the animal may escalate if people respond inappropriately such as running away. 'Can include growling, snarling and stalking'.

Action taken: Waddy Rangers have been made aware of the event, dingo safe briefings and patrols of the Waddy Point beach area, supervisors notified, preliminary report sent 3/10/14.

Proposed further action: Continue patrols and educational briefings of this area.

[sch4p3(3) Prejudic] continued to try and deter the dingoes by kicking sand. The dingoes left of their own accord after 5 minutes.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3(3) Prejudi] had not recieved a ranger dingo safety brief and were unaware of dingo safe messaging recommendations to carry a walking stick.

BWR13m is a known habituated dingo and has previously displayed threatening and high risk behaviour.

One had a green tag in the left ear and was dark in colouration and the other was unidentified as it stayed high up in the dune. The male, green tagged dingo was the aggressor as it circled and stalked [sch4p3(3)] pushing her towards the water, until she was knee deep in the water. The dingo got within 2 metres of [sch4p3(3)] growling and asserting its dominance by pushing her into the sea. This persisted for 5-10 minutes, with [sch4p3(3)] waving her hat and yelling at the dingo and eventually the dingo became disinterested. The two dingoes then headed south.

Detailed report of events: On the 15/11/2014 at approx. 0900 [sch4p3(3) Prejudi] and his wife (name unspecified) were walking along the beachfront adjacent to the Duling camping area, when approached by a dingo heading south from N'gkala Rocks.

The dingo circled the couple, initially from a distance, and then moved in closer (less than 5 meters).

[sch4p] and his wife became concerned for their safety when the dingo repeatedly stopped them from returning to their camp in the Duling camping area.

The dingo then proceeded to herd them away from the Duling camping area, so [sch4p] and his wife retreated into the ocean for safety. The dingo followed them a short distance into the ocean as well.

An onlooker saw the interaction and intervened by putting their car between the dingo and [sch4p] and his wife enabling them to return up the beach to their camp.

No identifying features of the dingo such as an ear tag, gender, scars and sock markings were noticed by [sch4p] and his wife. No photos were taken.

Additional comments and notes: No photos or identifying features of the dingo were noticed by [sch4p3] and his wife due to their concerns for their safety.

Although an exact age of the dingo wasn't ascertained, [sch4p3(3) Prejudi] described the dingo as being almost an adult and with dark colouring on its back and light flanks. This description is similar to sub-adult dingo features.

PRG13m regularly frequents this area and has a recorded management history of displaying threatening behaviour towards humans.

Action taken: Interview undertaken and report generated and circulated. RIC NRM and dingo ranger notified.

Proposed further action: Continue and increase ranger educational briefings on dingo safe messaging to all visitors in the area. Continue monitoring all dingo activities in the area.

His son was now about 10 meters away, he raced over and picked up his son as the dingo stopped within a meter.

[sch4p3(3) P] and two other adult males chased the dingo away but the dingo continued to loiter.

Another dingo was loitering in the area but was not involved in the interaction.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3(3) P] contacted the 13QGOV number at the end of December however the message was not received. Email received from [sch4p3(3) P] to follow-up on the interaction and NRM Rangers recorded the details.

Action taken: Dingo hotline answering machine and number checked to confirm no further issues.

Proposed further action: This dingo has been euthanised as a result of multiple negative dingo/human interactions.

I [sch4p3(3) P] opened the wooden door (so screen door still closed) to show the kids what a dingo looked like. As soon as it saw us it walked straight towards the door and laid down (seen in photo 1). It then approached closer and started to yip and bounce around like it wanted to play (photo 2 and 3). We made no encouraging movements and it was not scared of us at all.

It had one final lunge towards the door then trotted off down the southern side of the house with tail curled high in the air. It left the property [sch4p3(3) Prejudice the protection of an individual]

It was a male with a tag in its left ear. The tag was all either faded red or pink. It had a distinctive high left front sock (seen in photos). Had a fluffy tail with a white tip.

Additional comments and notes:

- Photos of the animal involved in this interaction have been analysed by a Dingo ranger. The ID of this dingo is consistent with BBR10m. BBR10m was involved in a Code D incident on the Bingih sand blow at Waddy Point on the 03.10.14
- Holiday season dingo safe message information packs were delivered to township houses on the 19.12.2014.





The men that intervened said that the dingo involved had a Green tag in its right ear, the other dingo had a Blue, White and Red tag in its left ear.

Detailed report of events: Camper reported the following at approximately 1210pm 29/12/14 whilst rangers were undertaking patrol -

Man had been visiting Eli Creek at approximately 1700hrs on 29/12/2014 when he observed a dingo lying on the higher bank at the southern end of the creek. The dingo howled and then appeared to consume something. Another dingo appeared and they briefly interacted with each other with some rough and tumble play before separating. The second of the dingoes made a beeline for the son of reporting person (21 y.o. who was lying or sitting in the water but stood up) then diverted attention to two teenage girls (approximately 16 years old) who were walking along the beach and began circling them within two metres. The observing man intervened at this stage by running at the dingo with a stick held up and then striking the sand with the stick. The man claimed that he could have struck the dingo if he wished to. The dingo remained unidentified throughout the interaction but took a step back, standing its ground. A vehicle came along, picked up the two women, and left the scene.

The first dingo remained up on the bank and did not participate in the interaction with persons.

Additional comments and notes: Media enquiries received recently may relate to this interaction?

Action taken: Reported incidentally, not proactively by campers. Left message on Fraser Island S/R phone 1218hrs and reported verbally to a/Principal Ranger 1220hrs and Eurong dingo ranger 1258hrs.

Proposed further action: Continue intensive monitoring and patrols of site and adjacent areas,

maintain temporary closure of adjacent camping zones.

[sch4p3(3) Pr] attempted to drive his vehicle between the dingo and the persons, but the dingo persisted, not backing down and lunging at (but not attempting to bite) the couple. [sch4p3(3) Pre] offered the persons a lift back to within the fenced Happy Valley area - this was declined, and [sch4p3(3) Pre] observed the couple walking back towards the Happy Valley fence with the dingo following closely behind them.

Additional comments and notes: [sch4p3(3) Pre] stated that there was another unidentified dingo nearby, but that it was not involved in the interaction. GGG13f and BWR13f are known to frequent this territory and have demonstrated escalated behaviour in recent months.

Incidentally, [sch4p3] stood up just as the dingo reached him, at which point the dingo stopped, briefly circled [sch4p3] who at this point realised that the dingo was there) and [sch4p3] shone a torch at the dingo but did not notice an ear tag. Comments **Current interperative material suggests that jogging will attract the attention of dingoes. This material also suggests that if visitors must jog, they should carry some sort of deterrent.**

Detailed report of events: [sch4p3(3) Preju] was travelling south towards Happy Valley at 0520 on the 29/12/14 with Two others. He noticed a Jogger being ambushed by a dingo. [sch4p3(3)] drove his vehicle towards the dingo to deter it from the female jogger who soon after entered the vehicle. The Lady was taken back to her vehicle in front of Happy Valley 500m to the south.

This interaction was captured on video by a camera mounted on the front of [sch4p3(3)] vehicle. The video shows the dingo approaching the jogger quickly from behind (to within 1m) while she tries to move away. The video quality is too poor to gain identification or sex of the dingo. [sch4p3(3)] and his friends could not positively identify or sex the dingo.

Additional comments and notes: Ranger 7027146 gathered report from [sch4p3(3) Preju] whilst briefing camps in Maheno CZ. Video of interacion is stored on Eurong G:\

Comments

Detailed report of events: At approx. 1615hrs ranger 7027330 was patrolling Nth through Eli creek when a lone adult male visitor was seen walking from the dune toward the sea. The visitor then ran the last 10-15m to the water and dove in. When the visitor began to run a dingo ran up behind him and followed him into the water. When the visitor turned around the dingo continued toward him up to its chest in the water preventing him from leaving the sea. At this point ranger 7027330 hit the dingo in the rump with a handful of wet sand and the dingo retreated Sth. The visitor identified himself as sch4p3(3) P sch4p3(3) Preju an RBAC tour guide and was visibly shaken. The dingo was followed to Eli Ck and was positively identified as BWR13M and photographed. GGG13F then appeared and with BWR13M began scavenging around the car park area. Both animals headed Sth at approx. 1700hrs.

Additional comments and notes: Both animals were travelling from Nth to Sth.

Action taken: Monitor animals, briefed daytrippers in the area especially those with children, 2IC Dundubara informed, SR Fraser informed, generate report.

Proposed further action: Continue patrolling and briefing regime, investigate closing area to food prep and consumption

Comments **The male that was the subject of the incident was not able to be interviewed as he had already left the area by the time Rangers left the creek.**

Detailed report of events: (Rangers 7027146 and 7027334 were conducting camper briefings and patrols in the Maheno camping zone when given information that GGG13f (and another male dingo) were seen running through the back of the camping zone approximately 20 minutes earlier. The campers being briefed reported seeing these two dingoes at other times during their stay. Rangers travelled to Eli Creek following the campers indicating that the dingoes had been chased away from their camp and they headed in the direction of Eli Creek.)

* A commercial tour operator driver indicated that he was present at Eli Creek edge when two dingoes (one of which he identified as GGG13f) approached the creek from the north and ran straight toward some visitors that were a little further along the creek than himself. He believed that they were cooking a BBQ and this is why they approached them. He states that they were chased away and they headed up toward the boardwalk.

* 7027146 and 7027334 went along the boardwalk and after a short while located GGG13f.

* GGG13f was observed standing on the southern side of Eli Creek bank and looking at the visitors swimming past her. She had an erect posture with tail raised. Her posture suggested that she was poised to lunge at something.

* This dingo then made several lunges toward a large male adult that was floating past in the creek.

* The dingo then lunged again and entered the water toward the male visitor.

* The visitor yelled at the dingo and attempted to kick it away from him.

* The dingo exited the creek on the southern side and continued to move along the creek bank in the cover of the trees while Rangers attempted to move it away from people in the creek.

* The dingo eventually crossed the creek and moved off to the north. It was not sighted again by 7027146 and 7027334.

Additional comments and notes: Blue White Red Male 2013 was also seen in the immediate vicinity of Eli Creek when Rangers arrived but was not sighted in conjunction with this incident.

Action taken: Notified SMU RIC and NRM staff 30/12/14.

Maintained on-site observation of this dingo by standing on the creek bank alerting swimmers to the potential danger.

7027146 and 7027334 left when SMU Rangers arrived and took over.

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


