Status Report – Outstanding nominations to the Queensland Heritage Register

Background

- The Queensland Heritage and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2007 was passed by Parliament on Thursday 18 October 2007 with commencement to be fixed by proclamation.
- The Act is to be proclaimed on 31 March 2008.
- The amended Heritage Act introduces a new process for dealing with nominations which requires that all interested parties are notified of nominations when they are received and that nominations are processed within a timeframe of 140 business days (7 months).
- There are 2 points in the nomination process when the timeframe may be extended by 40 days which could increase the timeframe for an additional 80 days (4 months) in total.
- For applications to enter or remove a place from the register the transitional provision s.111 provides that for applications that have not been decided (e.g. either provisionally entered or not entered) then the application is taken to be an application made by the chief executive. These applications are taken to be received on the date of commencement which will be 31 March 2008.
- For applications to enter or remove a place from the register that have been made by the Heritage Council the transitional provision s.112 states that on commencement these applications are taken to have ended. This provision was considered necessary because Heritage Council nominations do not meet the new information requirements.

Issues

- The current number of outstanding nominations to the heritage register is
 138 and 18 of these have been nominated by the Heritage Council.
- On commencement 120 of these nominations will be taken to be nominations under the amended Act and will have to be dealt with in 140 business days.
- The amended Act provides that if nominations are not decided in the time frame then they are deemed refused and cannot be re-nominated for 12 months.
- The EPA does not currently have sufficient resources to asses this number of places and efficiencies can be achieved by rolling some of the nominations into the state-wide survey.

Recommendations

 The 48 nominated places that are within areas that will be covered by the State-wide Survey teams in the next 12 months be transferred to the Statewide survey. Due to the imminent changes to the Heritage Act this will require a formal resolution from the QHC at tis March 2008 meeting, deciding not to deal with these nominations at the present time and transferring them to the State-wide survey. The places will be re-nominated as part of the state-wide survey process.

- 2. The QHC resolve that the precinct nominations not be progressed in the current form and a formal resolution be presented to the QHC at its March 2008 meeting.
- 3. Places nominated by the Heritage Council will be re-nominated by the Chief Executive under the amended Act once research work has been undertaken to support the nomination. Where appropriate these nominations should also be transferred to the State-wide survey.
- 4. The Heritage Council note that if the above recommendations are adopted 61 outstanding nominations will fall within nomination timeframes on the commencement date of 31 March 2008.

- The amended Heritage Act introduces a new process for dealing with nominations which requires that all interested parties are notified of nominations when they are received and that nominations are processed within a timeframe of 140 business days (7 months).
- For applications to enter or remove a place from the register the transitional provision s.111 provides that for applications that have not been decided (e.g. either provisionally entered or not entered) then the application is taken to be an application made by the chief executive. These applications are taken to be received on the date of commencement which will be 31 March 2008.
- For applications to enter or remove a place from the register that have been made by the Heritage Council the transitional provision s.112 states that on commencement these applications are taken to have ended. This provision was considered necessary because Heritage Council nominations do not meet the new information requirements.
- A strategy to deal with the outstanding nominations was put to the Heritage Council at its meeting on 1 February 2008.
- In essence the strategy was to move a number of nominations into the Statewide survey and to deal with the remaining places as a backlog project. The places to be moved into the State-wide survey are dealt with in item 6.5.
- EPA staff in central office will work on the backlog project for 4 to 5 months and this will mean ceasing work on the State-wide survey. Where possible contractors will be also be used to do backlog nominations.
- Heritage Council approved this strategy at its meeting on 1 February 2008 (resolution 213.4).
- There have been further nominations in January 2008.

- Under the transitional provisions all outstanding nominations will be taken to be nominations received on 31 March 2008.
- There are currently 142 outstanding nominations.
- A strategy to deal with the outstanding nominations was put to the Heritage Council at its meeting on 1 February 2008.
- The Heritage Council agreed that 142 nominations could not be handled concurrently and that some nominations could be transferred to the Statewide survey.
- The proposal is for 51 places that have been nominated to be considered as part of the State-wide survey.
- These 51 places are in regions where a survey is currently underway.
- A backlog mining places project will also be undertaken.
- The mechanics of the proposal are that the places would be renominated when the surveys are completed.

Cultural Heritage Significance

The Riverside Centre is a place of cultural heritage significance and satisfies one or more of the criteria specified in s.23 (1) of the Act as evidenced, but not exclusively, by the following statement of heritage significance based on criteria a, d, e and h: ????

The Riverside Centre is important in demonstrating the evolution and pattern of the development of commercial building in Brisbane. An example of the way in which the maritime buildings of the previous century (warehouses, insurance and shipping agents, wharf buildings etc) were replaced by office towers following the relocation of the port and changes in commerce. It was the tallest building in Queensland by five storeys when first erected. It was the first (?) of the late 20th century high-rise buildings in the Brisbane CBD to embrace the presence of the river in its design? NOT THE FIRST, BUT PROBABLY THE MOST INFLUENTIAL OF THE MODERN DESIGNS. DON SAYS IT IS A VERY SOPHISTICATED BUILDING COMPARED TO WHAT CAME BEFORE.

It might be said to be a good example of a high-rise building of its era and demonstrates both Seidler's approach to towers ie a very large footprint which opens the site, and also from a construction point of view as it uses a high level of repetition to gain economies of time and materials.

Though the building appears to be an accomplished example of Seidler's work rather than an innovative design, it has been generally admired and won several architectural prizes. A landmark building on the river bank.

The Riverside Centre is important as an example of the commercial work of Harry Seidler, an important 20th century architect in Australia. (The only one until recently – Riparian Plaza is now under construction)

History

The Riverside Centre is a 40-storey office tower in the Brisbane central business district and was constructed between 1983-1986 for General Property Trust through Lend Lease Development to the design of Australian-based architect Harry Seidler.

The first 'skyscraper' in Brisbane was Ascot Chambers, built in 1924-25 to the height limit then imposed by the Brisbane City Council. It was the tallest building in Queensland at the time and excited considerable public interest.

In the Interwar period the skyline of Brisbane CBD altered as more multi-storey commercial buildings were constructed and photographs taken looking along Queen Street in the late 1930s show an almost continuous series of high-rise buildings on each side of the street.

In 1965 a new town plan triggered considerable redevelopment in the Brisbane CBD. The first major modern high-rise in Brisbane was probably the SGIO building, said to be the first to top 100 metres and which was completed in 1970, *The height of this building varies in different accounts - 24 stories according to a contemporary account and 30 according to an international architectural web site – which?*

In 1974 the Brisbane City Council Sesquicentenary souvenir remarked that the 'massive construction of high-rise office blocks gives an indication of the development currently occurring in Brisbane'. It was an era when progress was notoriously measured by cranes on the Brisbane skyline and conservation groups fought to preserve 19th century buildings occupying prime sites.

The first landmark high-rise building to be constructed near the river in Eagle Street was the 1976 AMP Place, which featured a golden glass curtain wall and was the first such building in Queensland. It was the tallest building in the state at 35 storeys. Between 1970 and 1990 over 20 major high-rise buildings were constructed in the Brisbane CBD (23 floors and over).

Harry Seidler designed the Riverside Centre in 1983. It replaced a number of nineteenth century warehouses and offices including Luya Julius, Sun Alliance, Scottish Union, Chiropractic House and associated wharves and buildings. (These were recognised by the National Trust and by Brisbane City Council as having heritage significance)

The Riverside Centre tower was designed as part of a phased project comprising a triangular tower of 40 storeys, a lower tower of cylindrical shape and an apartment block of undulating form along the riverbank. The triangular tower was built first but the later phases of the project did not proceed. The shape of the Riverside tower allowed a maximum number of windows to overlook the river and a large plaza that extended right to the waterfront surrounded the new tower. Ferry wharves were planned as well as underground car parking.

Harry Seidler was born in Austria in 1923. In 1938 he moved to Britain and attended the Cambridge Technical College, then in 1941 he went to Canada where he studied for a degree in architecture. He then studied with leading figures of the modern movement such as Walter Gropius and Marcel Breuer at the Harvard School of Design and with Joseph Albers in North Carolina. He also worked with Breuer in New York and briefly with Oscar Niemeyer in Rio de Janeiro. He arrived in Australia, where his parents had settled, in 1948. His works in Australia include a house for his parents in 1948, Blues Point Tower, Sydney (1962), Australia Square,

Sydney (1967), Edmund Barton Offices, Canberra (1974) (which are on the Australian Heritage Places Inventory together with the Rose Seidler house and the Myilly Terrace house in Darwin). He also designed the MLC Centre, Sydney (1978) and Grosvenor Place, Sydney (1988). Overseas, Seidler designed the Australian Embassy in Paris (1977), The Hong Kong Club (1983), and a mixed-use housing scheme in Vienna. Currently another major Seidler project, the 53 level Riparian Plaza, is being constructed close to the Riverside Centre.

It was said by the jury of the Sir Zelman Cowan Award that 'it was not that Harry Seidler had done anything radically new with his own already well honed skills but that the scale and size the project allowed its very simple clean cut design approach to make an impact by its repetition over a large area and a number of small buildings at concourse level.'

Perhaps it can be said to 'clearly illustrate the architectural principles on which his design are based' as with the Edmund Barton Offices? It does provide considerable open space at the foot of the tower, which seems to be a feature of his buildings. (Note that Riverside is not listed with 'notable works in Australia' on the Seidler biographical site.)

Riverside Towers was possibly the first of the late 20th century buildings in this part of the Brisbane CBD to respond architecturally to the presence of the river, as the Customs House did a hundred years earlier. The AMP tower is almost as close to the water as the Riverside Centre and has similar river views from its upper levels, but is boxed in by three streets on its triangular site. Riverside Centre allows public access to the riverbank.

Riverside was completed in 1986 and won the Sir Zelman Cowan Award for Public Buildings in 1987. The jury decided that it could be considered for this award, though it was a commercial building, because of the public use of its surrounding plaza. Craft markets begun by local restaurateur, Peter Hackworth, have since become a major attraction in Brisbane.

The Jury's report for this award praised its... unique relationship to the Brisbane River...in this case, the river is not only part of the building, but a focal point. Plaza areas link the building to the waterfront. Waterfalls provide a visual link with the water's edge. Ferries, Yachts and pleasure craft tie up at the piers, watched by people at the open-air plaza restaurants.

Riverside Centre also won the Marble Architectural Awards (Carrara Italy) in 1989 (for the use of stone in a building – is there any marble in it?) and the RAIA (Queensland) Robin Dods Triennial Medal in 1989.

Changes to the tower building since completion appear to be minimal. There are some changes of tenancies in the plaza buildings, but the type of tenants – eg restaurants, bars and services such as a pharmacy appear to be similar. The recent Pig and Whistle tenancy, apart from some signage, appears to be largely a refit and has had minor visible effect on the plaza.

Questions

Of Lawrie at BCC -

Did it have an effect on the kind of plans later submitted for riverfront development? Do they think it may have triggered a new interest in the river, or was it a response to this? BCC river initiatives?

Of Seidler -

Where does it sit in his oeuvre?

The design concept – effect on design of not proceeding with stages originally planned? Were any modifications made because of this? Does he think this affected the way in which the building addresses the river etc.

Is it a d? – to what extent and in what ways can it be considered 'typical' of his work?

How important to the design does he feel the foyer sculpture is? Did he work with the artist or choose the design? Should it be included in the listing? Can I have some info on the artist? What about landscaping, the tree etc. What does he feel should be included in the listing? (it may be necessary for practical reasons to exclude tenancies – at least in the tower, or at least internal work as it is subject to continual change)

How innovative were construction methods with respect to Brisbane? Where there any construction problems which may have been associated with this?

Of Stewart -

The heritage agreement may address tenancies in the plaza where they have high visibility – guidelines for signage and external work for instance. Amendments to the Act may make it possible to exclude types of work such as tenancy re-fits in the tower – things like carpet, partitions, decorative schemes are normally easily reversible anyway. Is there a paper or guidelines on the form and wording on heritage agreements, or on the amendments to the Act?

Process:

Pursuant to the provisions of the Queensland Heritage Act 1992, the Heritage Council has formed the opinion that this is a place of cultural significance which satisfies one or more of the criteria for provisional entry in the Heritage Register and that it is possible for the cultural heritage significance of the place to be conserved.

The decision of the Heritage Council is recorded in the minutes of the Council meeting of *****.

Note: This document has been prepared on the basis of current information, and assessed under the criteria in the Queensland Heritage Act. This document may be reassessed if further evidence becomes available. The statement of significance specifies the most important heritage values of the place. The purpose of this document is to provide an informed evaluation for heritage registration. Recommendation

- The Director-General note that, because of misleading information in Heritage Council minutes and the media, EPA has been asked to supply documents under FOI that don't exist; and
- EPA officers may be required to appear as witnesses in a court case connected with the Riverside Centre.

Director General's Comments

Background

- On 13 December 2002, the Queensland Heritage Council (QHC) **itself** nominated the Riverside Centre for entry on the Queensland Heritage Register and requested that its assessment by Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) officers be a priority.
- No information other than a 1988 photographic study was tabled at the meeting, although the minutes (142.6.2.1) state that a report was prepared by the EPA for the meeting. QHC Secretariat advised (31.01.02) that 'the minutes overstate what was tabled'.
- A preliminary draft for the register has been prepared subsequently for consideration by the Heritage Register Advisory Committee (HRAC) and is likely to be scheduled for its March meeting.
- EPA planning officers' recommendation will be:
- > To limit any entry to the exterior and public spaces within and without the building; and

➤ That a group of landmark buildings in Brisbane be reviewed as possible exemplars for assessment of future nominations to the Heritage Register and the Riverside Centre be considered in this context i.e. consideration of the entry be deferred.

Key Issues

- The architect of the Riverside Centre, Harry Seidler, is suing the tenants of the Pig 'n' Whistle tenancy under the *Copyright Amendment (Moral Rights) Act 2000*. Because of the nomination, the EPA may be asked/subpoenaed for an opinion on the building's significance.
- The nomination was made by the QHC itself with no supporting information and was announced to the media prior to discussion by the QHC. The newspaper article stated that the building had been the subject of several years' research by the EPA, which is not the case. EPA files have been subject to an FOI request by legal firm Freehills.
- Because of the large number of tenancies in a high-rise building such as this, and because of the novel nature of the nomination, it is likely that it will be contested and media interest will be high.

It was the tallest building in the state at 35 storeys. Between 1970 and 1990 over 20 major high-rise buildings were constructed in the Brisbane CBD (23 floors and over).

Harry Seidler designed the Riverside Centre in 1983. It replaced a number of nineteenth century warehouses and offices including Luya Julius, Sun Alliance, Scottish Union, Chiropractic House and associated wharves and buildings. (These were recognised by the National Trust and by Brisbane City Council as having heritage significance)

The Riverside Centre tower was designed as part of a phased project comprising a triangular tower of 40 storeys, a lower tower of cylindrical shape and an apartment block of undulating form along the riverbank. The triangular tower was built first but the later phases of the project did not proceed. The shape of the Riverside tower allowed a maximum number of windows to overlook the river and a large plaza that extended right to the waterfront surrounded the new tower. Ferry wharves were planned as well as underground car parking.

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Riverside Towers was possibly the first of the late 20th century buildings in this part of the Brisbane CBD to respond architecturally to the presence of the river, as the Customs House did a hundred years earlier. The AMP tower is almost as close to the water as the Riverside Centre and has similar river views from its upper levels, but is boxed in by three streets on its triangular site. Riverside Centre allows public access to the riverbank.

Perhaps it may be said to 'clearly illustrate the architectural principles on which his design are based' as with the Edmund Barton Offices? It provides considerable open space at the foot of the tower, which seems to be a feature of his buildings. (Note that Riverside is not listed with 'notable works in Australia' on the Seidler biographical site.)

Riverside was completed in 1986 and won the Sir Zelman Cowan Award for Public Buildings in 1987. The jury decided that it could be considered for this award, though it was a commercial building, because of the public use of its surrounding plaza. Craft markets begun by local restaurateur, Peter Hackworth, have since become a major attraction in Brisbane.

The building won the Selman Cowan Award, The jury said that 'it was not that Harry Seidler had done anything radically new with his own already well honed skills but that the scale and size the project allowed its very simple clean cut design approach to make an impact by its repetition over a large area and a number of small buildings at concourse level.' The award citation also praised its ... 'unique relationship to the Brisbane River...in this case, the river is not only part of the building, but a focal point. Plaza areas link the building to the waterfront. Waterfalls provide a visual link with the water's edge. Ferries, Yachts and pleasure craft tie up at the piers, watched by people at the open-air plaza restaurants.'

Riverside Centre also won the Marble Architectural Awards (Carrara Italy) in 1989 (for the use of stone in a building) and the RAIA (Queensland) Robin Dods Triennial Medal in 1989.

Changes to the tower building since completion appear to be minimal. There are some changes of tenancies in the plaza buildings, but the type of tenants – eg restaurants, bars and services such as a pharmacy appear to be similar. The recent Pig and Whistle tenancy, apart from some signage, appears to be largely a refit and has had minor visible effect on the plaza.

- The Heritage Council nominated this place for entry on the Queensland Heritage Register with a request for priority status. No information other than a 1988 monograph comprising photographs and an essay in praise of the original design concept was tabled and no other information was held by the Agency.
- Considerable research has since been carried out and a report in the form of a preliminary draft entry to the Heritage Register has been prepared and is attached.
- As this is highly likely to be a contentious listing, the opinion of the Heritage Register Advisory Committee is sought on possible significance and whether or not outside expertise should be sought on this matter.
- It is believed that the architect of the Riverside Centre is currently suing the tenants of the Pig and Whistle tenancy under recent amendments to the Australian Copyright Act that protect the right of integrity of authorship of artistic creations. Staff architect, Peta Dennis, and I recently visited the site to make a note of changes, including those carried out in the Pig and Whistle re-fit.





Firstly, thanks for the opportunity to meet with yourself and Peta yesterday afternoon. Thanks also for explaining the process and likely timeframe in assessing the nomination of the Riverside Centre.

We reiterate our concern and that of our consultants, Allom Lovell, that the nomination of the Riverside Centre be appropriately evaluated in terms of the work of the architect, of post-1980's places generally in the Queensland Heritage Register, and of commercial office towers within the Brisbane CBD.

We also reaffirm our genuine concern regarding the proposal to seek Harry Seidler's opinion on the proposed listing, in light of recent legal issues between Seidler and the building owner on the matter of 'moral rights' and in particular the design of the Pig 'N' Whistle. We believe that this may adversely influence his opinion and only serve to complicate the issues at hand.

Ken, as you willingly acknowledged a commercial mixed use development of this magnitude (>50,000m²) is continually evolving with constant tenant changes, technological and environmental improvements and upgrades to plant, services and equipment. On the question of pending works we note that the following items were openly discussed:

- replacement of the existing revolving doors with automatic doors;
- reduction in size of the auditorium on level 6;
- relocation of toilet amenities on level 6;
- raising the height of the glass balustrades overlooking the lobby;
- construction of two new restaurants at boardwalk level;
- slab infill over the old and redundant ASX trading floor on level 5;
- facade changes on levels 5 & 6 to accommodate new 'sky gardens';

- break-through with Riparian Plaza;
- ground floor coffee kiosk;

Notwithstanding we look forward to walking through with both Peta and Maureen next Thursday so that they can both see first hand what works we are proposing in the near future.

Ken, please be assured that General Property Trust and Jones Lang LaSalle fully recognise the special qualities and characteristics of the Riverside Centre and we will continue to maintain the building, plaza and surrounds to the highest standard.

Accordingly we look forward to working with you and the EPA to resolve the question of appropriate future care for the site.
