Points of relevance

The development assessment process

- In order to carry out certain types of developments, an application may need to be made for a development permit.
- The *Planning Act 2016* mandates the framework and process for development assessment and also the basic requirements for an application.
- In most cases local government is the assessment manager for development proposed in its area, except in those cases where the State specifies that it has a particular interest through the planning regulation, and the State assesses those aspects of the development administered by State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA) (which falls under DSDMIP) by using the State Development Assessment Provisions.
- In making decisions, local authorities must take into account their local planning schemes and related bylaws when considering impacts.

The development in question

- In the case of the residential development at 229-233 Jesmond Road, Fig Tree Pocket, the area described as Lot 7 on Plan RP 806355 was zoned as an emerging community area in City Plan 2014 signalling the intent to intensify the use of the land for urban purposes.
- Brisbane City Council issued development approval A004078868 on 26 November 2015 to allow five dwellings to be developed.
- Consideration of wildlife impacted as part of a proposed development including protected plants was not part of the approval process as the matter did not trigger any relevant state-interests as defined in the State Development Assessment Provisions.
- However, any destruction or movement of wildlife impacted by lawful, approved development requires separate approval (i.e. after the planning assessment/approval has occurred) under the *Nature Conservation Act 1992* (the Act).
- In Queensland, all plants that are native to Australia are regarded as 'protected plants' under the Act. A flora survey trigger map is prepared under the Act and identifies high-risk areas where individual plant species that are endangered, vulnerable or near threatened (EVNT) are present or likely to be present. It is a requirement before commencing any clearing that a copy of the flora survey trigger map on the Department of Environment and Science's (the department) website be obtained to determine whether any part of the area to be cleared is within a high-risk area.
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- In this case, the department has undertaken a search (**Attachment 1- Flora Survey Trigger Map**) and the subject property is within a high-risk area – therefore a clearing permit is required from the department before any clearing can occur (unless the clearing can avoid EVNT plants by at least 100 metres). Further information on the

protected plants framework is available on the department's website at <https://www.ehp.qld.gov.au/licences-permits/plants-animals/protected-plants/>.

- The Nature Conservation (Wildlife Management) Regulation 2006 also prohibits tampering with a native animal breeding place except under specific conditions, which include the activity being part of a species management program (SMP) approved by the department.
- A SMP provides specific information on the species and habitat covered by the plan, identifies potential impacts on the species from the land clearing and sets out appropriate management actions to help avoid, mitigate and manage those potential impacts. Animal breeding places include obvious structures such as bird nests and tree hollows, as well as more obscure places such as amphibian or frog habitat where breeding takes place.
- If there are animal breeding places on the property, then the proponent may need to apply to the department for an SMP. Further information about SMPs is available on the department's website at www.ehp.qld.gov.au/licences-permits/plants-animals/species-management-program/.

- Further, in Queensland, all plants that are native to Australia are regarded as 'protected plants' under the Act. A flora survey trigger map is prepared under the Act to identify high-risk areas where individual plant species that are endangered, vulnerable or near threatened (EVNT) are present or likely to be present. It is a requirement before commencing any clearing that a copy of the flora survey trigger map on the Department of Environment and Science's (the department) website be obtained to determine whether any part of the area to be cleared is within a high-risk area.
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- In this case, the department has undertaken a search (**Attachment 1, Flora Survey Trigger Map**) and the subject property is within a high-risk area – therefore a clearing permit is required from the department before any clearing can occur (unless the clearing can avoid EVNT plants by at least 100 metres, as usually determined by the undertaking of a flora survey by a qualified person). Field Code Changed

- The Nature Conservation (Wildlife Management) Regulation 2006 also prohibits tampering with a native animal breeding place except under specific conditions, which include the activity being part of a species management program (SMP) approved by the department.
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- Upon investigation of the circumstances of this development, the department has determined that the developers (having engaged a consultant to undertake a flora survey) proceeded on the basis of their exemption from the requirement to hold a clearing permit.
- On further assessment, the department has determined that the exemption was based on a protected flora survey report which stated that the Queensland Herbarium had deemed a recorded protected plant recorded to be "outside its natural range". On the basis of this, the developer assessed that the plant was "not in the wild" which qualifies the proposal for exemption.
- Due to the lack of additional evidence and documentation to support the proposal that the protected plant was "not in the wild", the department issued a non-immediate cancellation of the clearing exemption until such time as the developers provided further evidence to ensure that the near-threatened plant is not considered in the wild.
- ~~On Friday 19 October 2002 18. This~~ the non-immediate cancellation was served electronically to Bernoth Pty Ltd (the holder of the protected plant clearing exemption), ~~on Friday 19 October 2018.~~
- The proponent (Bernoth) has until 20 November 2018 to respond to the department's non-immediate cancellation.
- In the meantime, the proponent must refrain from any clearing to avoid the clearing of the identified protected plants.
- ~~DES Senior Wildlife Officer, Sam Dawes, The department~~ has subsequently received correspondence from the fauna spotter engaged by Bernoth who has also advised that animal breeding places may be present on the Jesmond Road site.
- The department has therefore restated the requirement that the proponent will need to apply for a Species Management Program to justify any tampering (disturbance) with animal breeding places.
- To date, the department has not received any correspondence from either the proponent (Bernoth) with respect to the non-immediate cancellation or from the fauna spotter engaged by Bernoth.
- A Wildlife Officer will also conduct a drive-by inspection of the site to determine the status of works at the site during the week beginning 29 October 2018.

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Jesmond Road, Fig Tree Pocket

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- DES Senior Wildlife Officer, Sam Dawes, has subsequently received correspondence from the fauna spotter engaged by Bernoth who has advised that animal breeding places may be present on the Jesmond Road site.
- The department has reiterated the position that the proponent will need to apply for a Species Management Program to justify any tampering (disturbance) with animal breeding places.

As per our conversation on the phone this afternoon, we are urgently asking that the Environment Department intervene to protect urban native bushland at 229, 231 and 233 Jesmond Road in Fig Tree Pocket (A004078868). This development should never have been approved by the Brisbane City Council as it is in an area of sensitive flora and fauna and overlay maps show that it needs to be protected.
